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Guidelines for Cremation & Burial

More and more Americans are selecting cremation at the time of a funeral. For many years the Church prohibited cremation because there was a concern that those who were choosing that option were prompted to do so by a denial of our belief in the resurrection of the body.

The Church now permits cremation, but with some reservations.

Although it is permissible to be cremated, it is the Church's preference that the body of the deceased be present for funeral rites. Why is respect for the human body and the presence of the human body such a high value? The Order of Christian Funerals (OFC) states: "The body of the deceased Catholic Christian is also the body once washed in Baptism, anointed with the oil of salvation, and fed with the Bread of Life. The body of the deceased brings forcefully to mind the Church's conviction that the human body is in Christ a temple of the Holy Spirit and is destined for future glory at the resurrection of the deca" (412).

If the deceased is to be cremated, it is usually best to have the cremation after the funeral rites so that the body is present for the wake and the funeral Mass. Although it is permissible to have the cremated remains at the funeral Mass, the presence of the body is preferable because it helps mourners face the reality of a person's death and allows the Church to express the fullness of its belief during the funeral rites.

What about the place of final disposition for cremated remains? "The cremated remains of a body should be treated with the same respect given the human body from which they come. This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes, the manner in which they are carried, the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport, and the final disposition. The cremated remains must be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains (or a portion of the cremated remains) on the water, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or friend of the deceased is to be avoided at all times. Whenever possible, appropriate means for recording with dignity the memory of the deceased should be adopted, such as a plaque or headstone which records the name of the deceased" (OCF, 417).

The Catholic funeral rites can bring great consolation to the family and friends of the deceased, because "In the face of death, the Church confidently proclaims that God has created each person for eternal life and that Jesus, the Son of God, by his death and resurrection, has broken the chains of sin and death that bound humanity."

As we pray at the grave side: "Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let Perpetual Light shine upon them. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen."



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ST. MARY CATHOLIC CHURCH – POLICY ON EULOGIES AT FUNERALS (7/18/20)

The preferred time and place for a eulogy is at the funeral home during the wake or in conjunction with the vigil service. Another ideal time to share stories about a loved one is the luncheon/reception. These are more informal settings that lend themselves to memories, stories, and jokes. It may also be possible to say some words of remembrance at the graveside before or after the committal prayers.

If the family insists on saying some words of remembrance at the church they may do so in the following way:

- *Before* the funeral Mass begins one person may speak in the narthex (lobby) for a maximum of 5 minutes.
- Those who wish to attend the funeral Mass will be invited to the narthex to listen.
- If a family member is to speak they should do this at least 5 minutes before the announced start time of the funeral Mass so as not to delay the start of Mass.
- The one speaking should bear in mind that they are in the church building and should conduct themselves with decorum. They are to refrain from inappropriate language or humor. They are to refrain from expressing views that are contrary to Catholic faith and morals.

This is the policy at St. Mary Catholic Church and there will be no exceptions.

Why we have this policy

The Church's official ritual book for funerals states the following: "A brief homily based on readings should always be given at the funeral liturgy, but <u>never any kind of eulogy</u>. The homilist should dwell on God's compassionate love and on the Paschal Mystery of the Lord as proclaimed in the Scripture Readings" (*Order of Christian Funerals*, 141).

While neither the priest nor anyone else is to deliver a eulogy, the priest can and usually does include references to the life of the deceased person in his homily. Please speak to the priest about your loved one's life. He likely may include aspects of their faith and virtues that highlight the Christian discipleship to which we are all called.

Holy Mass is the Church's highest form of prayer. The Mass is offered for the repose of the soul of the deceased. In practice, words of remembrance often include long stories and jokes that, while reflective of a family member's love for the deceased, are not appropriate within the formal context of the solemn prayer of the Mass.

Holy Communion Guidelines

As Catholics, we believe that Jesus Christ becomes truly present body, blood, soul, and divinity in a mystical, yet real way at every Holy Mass. It is not just a symbol, but the real presence of Jesus. By the power of the Holy Spirit, normal bread and wine are transformed into Jesus' body and blood. What still looks like bread and wine is really Jesus under sacramental signs. As St. Paul reminds us, *"For I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, "This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way also the chalice, after supper, saying, "This chalice is the new covenant in my blood." Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." (1 Cor 11:23-25).*

At the Funeral Mass we certainly welcome everyone in attendance as we are uniting together in prayer for our brother or sister in the Lord. **By receiving Holy Communion at Mass we are essentially saying two things:** *First*, I'm in "union with" the Pope, therefore, a member of the Catholic Church. *Secondly*, we are saying that our moral life is in "union with" Jesus and His Church; this is manifest by following what Jesus and the Church teach regarding faith and morals.

We encourage all who are Catholic, practicing their faith, and in union with Church teachings to receive Holy Communion at the Mass. If you need to receive the sacrament of Confession, please do so prior to receiving Jesus in Holy Communion. As St. Paul continues in 1 Corinthians, "Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of profaning the body and blood of the Lord" (1 Cor 11:27). The Eucharist is the central mystery of our Catholic faith and it is vitally important to be respectful of so great a gift. Any gift received properly is received with love, and that's why receiving Jesus in Holy Communion with love presupposes a way of life that is striving to live in "union with" our Lord and His Church.

If you are a non-Catholic it is normally not permitted to receive Holy Communion at Mass, but we do invite you to either come forward during distribution of Holy Communion for a blessing or to remain in the pew praying for the deceased and seeking a deeper union with the Lord. You can indicate your desire to receive a blessing from the priest by crossing your arms over your chest when you come forward.

The priest at Mass will also make a general reminder for all present at the funeral mass on the guidelines for receiving Holy Communion. Thank you for respecting this amazing gift as we offer the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass for your loved one.

Scripture Readings

In the funeral liturgy a total of three readings are recommended.

You will need to select <u>one Old Testament</u> reading, <u>one New Testament</u> reading, and <u>one Gospel</u> reading. Family members or friends of the deceased are encouraged to proclaim the first two readings. Generally, it is good to select a person to proclaim the Scriptures who has some public speaking experience. The priest or deacon always proclaims the Gospel reading.

<u>Note:</u> If you have a favorite scripture reading you wish to use, but it is not listed here, the reading must first be approved by our pastor, and the translation **must** be taken from the Catholic "New American Bible".

A reading from the Book of Ecclesiastes

so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. For this is why Christ died and came to life, that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why then do you judge your brother? Or you, why do you look down on your brother?

For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God; for it is written:

"As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me, and every tongue shall give praise to God."

So then each of us shall give an account of himself to God.

Music for the Funeral Liturgy

"Music is integral to the funeral rites. It allows the community to express convictions and feelings that words alone may fail to convey. It has the power to console and uplift the mourners and to strengthen the unity of the assembly in faith and love." (OCF, 30)

Non-liturgical or secular music is not allowed in the Church:

Thus, such music as "The Prayer", "Wind Beneath My Wings", "I Will Remember You", "From a Distance", "Candle In The Wind" and "Danny Boy", etc. may not be used before, during or after the funeral rites in Church. Any music from stage or screen is not allowed during Catholic liturgy. If you have a non-liturgical or secular song that is special to you, we suggest that you speak with the funeral director about playing a CD of this song during the visitation at the funeral home, or at the funeral luncheon. Recorded music cannot be used as part of the funeral liturgy at the church.

Please note:

Our Director of Music & Liturgy, Rick Yurs, is the organist/vocalist for all funerals here at St. Mary. If you wish to have a female vocalist, Rick can get one of our parish cantors for you, but there will be an additional fee. The members of St. Mary Music Ministry are the preferred musicians/vocalists for all liturgies here at St. Mary, and bring many years of experience and liturgical expertise. They do an excellent job and are expected to provide the music for the funeral liturgy. "Outside musicians" are not typically used for a funeral liturgy. If you wish to have a guest vocalist, they may sing the Offertory and/or the second Communion song at the discretion of the Director of Music Ministry. The parish cantor will lead the assembly in all other singing.

The Responsorial Psalm and the Song of Farewell (during the incensing of the body) will be chosen by the Music Director.

In the funeral liturgy there are five places for songs:

- The Entrance Song (during the procession into the church)
- The Song during the Preparation of the Altar and Presentation of the Gifts
- The Communion Song
- Optional Meditation Song following Communion
- The Recessional Song. (The recessional song is sometimes sung by the assembly, but <u>it normally sung as a solo</u> as everyone is leaving the church.)

Important – Please Note:

We ask that the family not indicate the order and placement of any of the songs for the funeral liturgy. This is best left to the good judgment and liturgical experience of St. Mary's Director of Music Ministry. Thank you for your cooperation.

During the incensing of the casket / urn a version of "May the angels lead you into paradise…" will be sung by the cantor.
